Agenda Items

1. Opening and Welcome

International Advisory Committee (IAC) Chairman, Bill Curtis, called the meeting to order at 9:00 EST. He gave his opening remarks and welcomed all attendees.

2. Attendee Introductions/Meeting Objectives

The Chair introduced Jon Beatty, President, Flight Safety Foundation (FSF), to the IAC. Jon gave a short introduction. He thanked the IAC for helping to put together a successful program for IASS 2017 in Dublin, and said he was looking forward to a successful IASS 2018 in Seattle. He informed the group that Boeing, and John Hamilton, FSF's new Chair, will support IASS 2018. Jon stated that a big focus for John Hamilton will be to look at FSF committee structure, and look for ways to improve communications between all FSF committees.

The Chair thanked Jon and led the attendee introductions around the room and online.

The Chair and Mark Millam stated that the focus of today's IAC meeting is to discuss the upcoming IASS, the IASS call for presentations, and to start forming the IASS agenda.

3. Review/Adoption of Past Minutes and Action Items

The Chair asked for comments on the past meeting minutes. David Mawdsley advised that it was Chris Solan from GE, not Chris Murray from Rolls-Royce, who attended part of the meeting and David called for the attendee list to be corrected. David also informed the group that "Rolls-Royce Digital" is now known as "Rolls-Royce R2 Data Labs" whom he represented at the Dublin IAC.

The Chair recognized that the ALPA activity listed on page 5 of the minutes was incorrectly captured. The Chair also added that titles for action items are needed.

The minutes were not approved since some action items need better description titles. The minutes will be open for approval at the next IAC meeting.

4. Dublin IASS Survey Results

Survey results from IASS 2017 were reviewed and discussed. Key remarks were as follows:

Attendees primary objective at IASS is professional development. Keep this in mind for agenda planning.

Time for questions discussed. Survey respondents and IAC members expressed unhappiness with length of actual questions, some bordered on speech-making. Moderators need to be on guard for speech making from audience. While we want to enhance the interactive portion of the seminar the moderators can help to guard against speech making from audience. Some of the speech from the floor results may indicate a need to balance the session presentations with multiple perspectives on the topic.

Some feedback suggested slides were not always easy to read. The process for managing the quality of slides was discussed. It was agreed we should do our best to lay out guidelines for the speaker's presentations, which includes size of fonts. Look to our moderators or session chairs to encourage speakers to follow the guidelines, but we won't make the moderators/session chairs/event coordinators establish a process for strict enforcement. At the same time we want moderators to be more active with their panel/session.

ACTION ITEM: Vice Chair tasked with drawing up guidelines for moderators. IAC encouraged to send him ideas/priorities.

The conference app may help for structuring interactivity. Using the conference app for submitting questions is a possibility. Speakers can respond to written questions through the app later or through a "speakers corner" made clear during the event. Questions from the floor should be entertained first.

Spouse events/opportunities should be investigated.

The IAC would like more meaningful survey data. The IAC offered to help FSF construct the survey for 2018 IASS. They would like to review all survey comments. More survey participants are desired. Offer a discount or raffle for filling out the survey. Use app to rate speakers/sessions as they occur. Downside, survey results are made public in the app.

Continue to encourage speakers to make their presentation slides legible, use appropriate font sizing, etc.

Some verbal feedback from IASS attendees, not reflected in the survey, indicates a need for more takeaways.

More involvement from IATA, and airlines was suggested. Also, more accident and incident presentations, case studies, were desired.

Some of the survey responses were truncated and had not been summarized completely. These included questions 7,8,9&10. Question 7 asked which presentations of greatest value. A complete quantitative analysis was not available, so Mark summarized which presentations received multiple responses. They included Erik Hollnagel (resilience), Kathy Fox (Canadian accident investigation), Danny Ho and Greg Marshall (FORAS), and Martin Smith and Bill Curtis (go around decision making). Question 8 asked which presentation had the least value. (China management system implementation), FORAS, and Amazon Prime data all had multiple responses. Mark mentioned these questions deserve further review to provide more quantitative results.

The full results from questions 7 thru 10 are provided in attachment B (Excel file). Questions 7 and 8 are quantified and summarized.

6. Top Safety Issues 2018

Mark Millam reviewed the current top 10 safety issues list and including some additional information about the 2017 performance. A small subcommittee has already been formed to help guide the staff efforts in maintaining the list and incorporate any new topics.

David Mawdsley questioned using only data provided by the Air Safety Network (ASN), stating their data is not comprehensive. Mark explained that ASN data forms the starting point and that the data accounting by the foundation is only in fatal accidents from this source. More robust processes are already in place and published from other organizations to describe the performance in non-fatal accident events (IATA, ICAO, CAAs). The broad topics provide FSF a handy way to organize and describe issues in so FSF can identify where they need to dig deeper. Many organizations use ASN and other public or internal information to produce their own top safety lists.

The Chair suggested FSF get inspiration from the Canadian safety board top watch list.

The Chair recommended the IAC look at what is emerging and focus on these issues since other organizations are not focusing on them. There are many organizations who are looking at safety issues that are already identified. Randy Kenagy suggested FSF look at how they can help pilots/airlines implement safety measures. The Chair recommended FSF take a closer look at runway safety and consider a slightly different heading for item 4 and 7 on our list.

The Chair and Mark Millam agreed to move the discussion and development of the list to the broader IAC agenda at the next meeting. Mark added that the list deserves better explanation of purpose but ultimately it is meant to be a broader, more inclusive list.

7. IASS 2018 Call for Presentation Topics

IAC member discussion identified the focus areas for IASS 2018 as depicted in attachment A.

Joe Barclay suggested three areas of focus for the IASS maintenance track:

- failure to follow procedures,
- quality and oversight, and
- professionalism (communication and collaboration).
- Topics such as flight data issues as they apply to maintenance, what is being done with all the data being collected, and cyber security with connected aircraft, should be considered.

Mark Millam and (Chairman) Bill Curtis will work to assemble the attachment A topics into groups along with a more descriptive explanation of the sections of the IASS potential agenda. This will serve as the basis for our call for papers.

Notes regarding the call for presentations were that FSF ask to collect the final presentation slide with the abstract, that complimentary speaker registration be advertised better, and to use social media as a tool to advertise the call for presentations.
