From Greenland to Antarctica - BARS Program makes global aircraft operations safer and celebrates its 1500th audit

The Basic Aviation Risk Standard (BARS) is proud to have reached the completion of the 1500th audit within its Program. BARS Operators come from 55 different nations across the globe with operations extending from Greenland to Antarctica. Since the beginnings of the BARS Program in 2010, a total of 1407 audits were performed on aircraft operators and 93 audits were done on operators of remotely piloted aerial systems, generally known as drones.

In early October, the 1500th audit within the BARS Program was performed on National Airways Corporation of Johannesburg, South Africa. It underwent its 12th BARS audit with BARS accredited audit company SGS to maintain continued Gold Status registration in the Program.

National Airways Corporation puts tremendous effort into safe operations and is a trusted aviation service provider for mining and resource sector companies and other customers. National Airways were not only one of the first BARS registered aircraft operators when they got onboard in 2010, they were also the first to ever achieve Gold Status within the Program.

The BARS Program is a global aviation audit program supporting the resource sector, as well as humanitarian, government, and insurance organizations in their oversight of contracted aviation activities. It was set up in 2010 by the Flight Safety Foundation and various companies from the mining and resource sector.

The BARS Program is active in 55 different countries and about 300 operators of traditional aircraft and helicopters as well as remotely piloted aerial systems have been audited so far. The program is supported by trainings, data analysis and a suite of aviation standards that include such diverse activities as passenger and cargo operations, offshore helicopter and external load operations, night vision goggle and medevac operations, or aerial geophysical survey and aerial mustering.
